As you travel north on Routes 12, 202 or 140, you may pass through the quiet north Worcester County Town of Winchendon, MA.

You may want to stop for a visit. Winchendon is a town rich with history. First settled in 1735 and known as New Ipswich Canada, the town was later incorporated in 1764 and named Winchendon after Nether Winchendon, a village and civil parish in the Aylesbury Vale District of Buckinghamshire, England.

Located near Millers River, Winchendon soon became a town of industry taking full advantage of the source of power harnessed from Millers River. Wood products were among the first to be manufactured and sold. In fact, at one time the production of wood shingles was so successful that the town became known as "Shingletown". Cotton mills, wood-working and metal working were also a part of the growing manufacturing industry in the town. It goes without saying; however, the toy industry put Winchendon on the map thanks to Morton E. Converse, who resided on Front St. in Winchendon ([Book 1279 page 564, 565](#)). Winchendon soon became known as "Toy Town".

In 1873, Morton Converse, in partnership with Orlando Mason, opened Mason & Converse to manufacture toys and woodenware. In 1883 the partnership was dissolved. Morton continued the business under the name Converse Toy and Woodenware Company with his uncle Alfred C. Converse.

A new manufacturing facility was purchased at the property

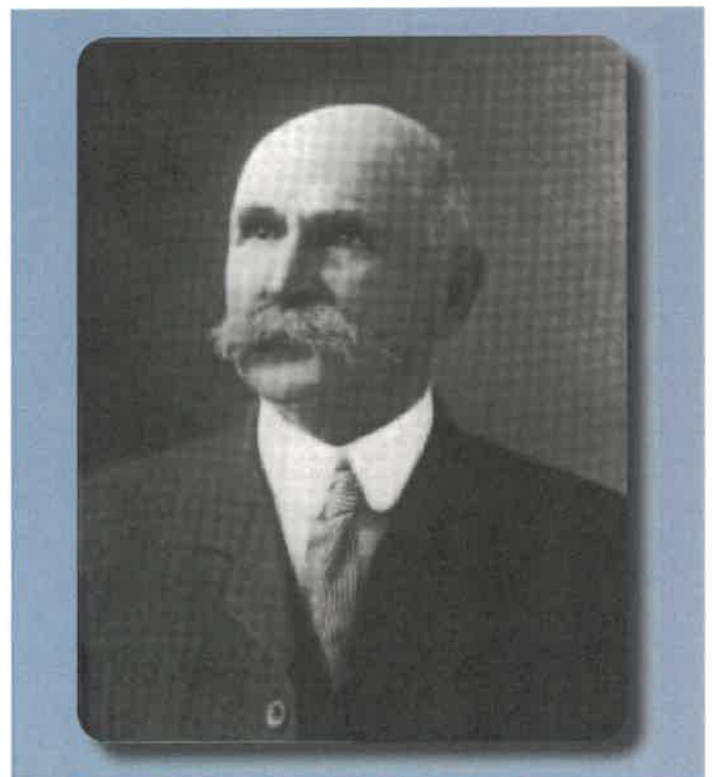

known as Monadnock Mill ([Book 1139 pages 179, 180, 181](#)). The business continued to grow and in 1887 the company was renamed the Morton E. Converse & Company.

Converse made a great variety of toys, including Noah's Arks, doll furniture, kiddie riding racers, drums, building blocks, pianos, trunks, farm houses, musical roller chimes and rocking horses. Due to Mr. Converse's ability to anticipate the toys children wanted, he was able to build the largest toy company in the United States. At the World's Fair in Chicago



in 1893, he received the highest awards for exhibiting the finest toys in the world. In 1912, Morton Converse built the original Giant Rocking Horse made from nine pine trees. The 12 foot hobby horse was named Clyde. In 1914, Clyde entered the local parade to celebrate the Winchendon's 150th anniversary. Clyde was on display at the railroad station for 20 years and then in 1934, moved to the Toy Town Tavern for 30 years and then sent into storage due to disrepair. A replica of Clyde was sculpted by Winchendon native Sherman LaBarge in 1988 using the original as a model. Clyde II is now on display in a covered pavilion on Front St in Winchendon for kids of all ages to see.
